

Graves Registration Report 2018from Graves Registration Officer Michael Emett


13 new graves submitted and accepted 111 graves in Montana; 55 grave in New Mexico (Santa Fe National), 29 graves in California with 18 scattered among the various states.

Among the graves were 31 soldiers who were "galvanized Yankees" 30 who were buried at Little Big Horn National Cemetery; 17 Confederates soldiers; 4 US Colored Troops.

Notables included: Adolph Metzger, bugler of the Fetterman Massacre; the only soldier who was not mutilated -- Captain George Nicholas Bascom; killed at Val Verde NM; known as the individual who set off the war with Cochise and the Apaches in Arizona circa 1860 -- William C. Minor, surgeon, committed to Broadmoor Insane Asylum for murder who was instrumental in contributing to the compiling of the Oxford Dictionary while committed.

It is with regret that I submit this substandard report for the year.

Wreaths Across America Ceremony

A Brief History,

Morrill Worcester, owner of Worcester Wreath Company of Harrington, Maine, was a 12 year old paper boy for the Bangor Daily News when he won a trip to Washington D.C. His first trip to the Nation's Capital was one he would never forget and Arlington National Cemetery made an especially indelible impression on him. This experience followed him throughout his life and successful career, reminding him that his good fortune was due, in large part, to the values of this nation and the veterans who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country.

In 1992, Worcester Wreath Company found themselves with a surplus of wreaths nearing the end of the holiday season. Remembering his boyhood experience at Arlington, Worcester realized he had an opportunity to honor our country's veterans. With the aid of Maine Senator Olympia Snowe, arrangements were made for the wreaths to be placed at Arlington in one of the older sections of the cemetery that had been receiving fewer visitors with each passing year.

As plans were under way, a number of other individuals and organizations stepped up to help. James Prout, owner of a local trucking company, "Blue Bird Ranch Inc., generously provided transportation all the way to Virginia. Volunteers from the local American Legion and VFW Posts gathered with members of the community to decorate each wreath with traditional red, hand tied bows. Members of the Maine State Society of

Washington, D.C. helped to organize the wreath laying, which included a special ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

The annual tribute went on quietly for several years, until 2005 when a photo of the stones at Arlington adorned with wreaths and covered in snow circulated around the internet. Suddenly the project received national attention. Thousands of requests poured in from all

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over the country from people wanting to help with Arlington, to emulate the Arlington project at their National and State cemeteries or to simply share their stories and thank Morrill Worcester for honoring our nation's heroes.

The Ceremony

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This year's Wreaths Across America ceremony began at precisely 9:00 am which matched with the 12:00 pm East coast ceremonies start time. Across the nation, all Wreath ceremonies where schedule to start at the exact same moment.

The ceremony took place at the Grand Army of the Republic circle where Civil War Veterans are buried.

Some of the Distinguished Guests attending were; Riverside Mayor Rusty Bailey, Council Member Mike Gardner, USAF Col. Kelly Hosey, USAF Col (retired) Jim Hosey along with the Board of Directors of Evergreen Memorial Historical Cemetery and representatives of the Riverside Cemetery Association Board of Directors.

The service opened with introductions by Brother John Morris followed by a moment of silence in memory of our departed veterans. After the Presentation of the Colors, Mr. Tim Apple sang the National Anthem and what a treat that was.

Brother Morris continued with a few opening remarks followed by Etienne Caroline, President of the Evergreen Memorial Historical Cemetery Board of Directors. Mr. Caroline commented about the significance

of having the Wreaths ceremony at the G.A.R. Circle and all of the history of the veterans interred at Evergreen, Riverside's oldest cemetery.

Evergreen Memorial Park Director Justin Ruff was the next speaker and he briefly spoke about the courage and sacrifices endured by the United States combat men and women and by this county's veterans.

CMSgt. Steve Simpson USAF was the final speaker of service and he also complemented the modern day American military and remarked of how appropriate the Wreaths Ceremonies are.

CMSgt. Simpson announced the names of the military personal who were to present wreaths to the American Military Service Branch flags that line the south portion of the G.A.R. Circle. These Wreath

presenters were escorted to their respective flag poles by Camp 18's musket team made up of Brother Rudy Velasco PCC, **Brother Steve Doyle** PCC, and Camp Commander Mike Bullard.

Master of Ceremonies Brother John Morris made a few closing re-

marks before signaling the Camp 18 musket team to begin their 3 volley musket salute which was followed by the playing of TAPS by Camp 18 friend Bugler Kasey Borders to end the ceremony.

Near the entry gate there were many volunteers of military personal, civilians and I believe I saw JROTC groups, to place the remaining wreaths on the headstones of the veteran's graves.

There were approximately 350 wreaths that were donated for this ceremony and approximately 1100 veterans interred at Evergreen Memorial Historical cemetery. The 350 wreaths were a bit short of the numbers needed so we will need a few more sponsors to volunteer donations for next year's Ceremony. If you can help, please do.





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
