Memorial Day Ceremony 2019

At the beginning of the summer, General Stoneman Camp 18 held their 10th annual Memorial Day Service on Saturday May 25th at Evergreen Memorial Historical Cemetery (EMHC) in Riverside. The Service was performed without any trouble to an audience of more than 60 people who enjoyed the Service.

Evergreen Memorial Historical Cemetery (EMHC) Board President Etienne Caroline, who addressed the audience during the Ceremony, added more local advertising for our Memorial Service which helped with the public attendance. Mr. Caroline also recommended Kaylee Harris (pictured far right) to sing the National Anthem which she performed flawlessly.

As in past years, our ceremony follows the ritual as prescribed in the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War *Ritual and Ceremonials* book, as the SUVCW has used for many years.

The Memorial program started with Camp Commander Michael Bullard making the Ritual opening remarks followed by Camp Chaplain Bill Daley PCC giving the Opening prayer and leading everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance and then, of course, Kaylee Harris sang the National Anthem.

Monument dedicated to the GAR.

Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War – Amanda Stokes Tent #87 President Judy Dillard also participated reading the "Only a Private Killed" Civil War poem.

Camp 18 Junior Vice Commander Matt Crowder read the very meaningful *General Logan's General Order No. 11*, a proclamation directing Union Civil War Veterans and families on decorating the graves of the fallen Civil War Union Soldiers. If you haven't read or heard General Order #11, you should. It is a very dear sentiment to the Civil War Veterans departed.

A special highlight of the ceremony is Camp Junior member Brother Bodie Crowder giving the ceremony's main address about the Lincoln Assassination which was very well received by the audience!

With the ceremony coming to a close, floral wreaths were presented to the U.S. Armed service branch flags. The wreath presenters were escorted by Camp 18 uniformed guards, included Brother Bodie Crowder and Mom Jennifer, DUVCW Sister Judy Dillard, EMHC Board members Nancy Cox & Judith Auth and SUVCW

2019 Cleveland National Encampment

For those of you who have never gone to an SUVCW National Encampment, let me give you an idea of what to expect. It is generally a 4 day event, which starts on a Thursday (this year, August 8th) with some type of tour offered by the Department hosting the event: in this case, the Department of Ohio. If you want to go on the Thursday tour, it is best to arrive on Wednesday, so that you are refreshed and ready for the long day of the tour. Actual Encampment business starts on Friday, all day, followed by some entertainment and Campfire in the evening.

Encampment business is continued on Saturday and includes the handing out of awards and election of officers. The evening is the finale with a Banquet Dinner being served. Sunday morning church services are offered before returning home (or continuing on your vacation in the area).

To be honest, I wasn't that excited about the tour being offered this year because it was mostly

about our 20th President, James A. Garfield, and "who cares", right? Well, I was definitely wrong on that assumption and am really glad I paid the \$49 for the tour.

We started at 10:30 a.m. and went to the Cleveland Soldiers and Sailors Monument in downtown Cleveland. This is well worth a stop if you are in the Cleveland area and it honors the soldiers and sailors from Ohio who died during the Civil War. You can see from the photo below it is a unique structure in that it is a combination of a spire *and* a Memorial Hall. You can easily spend over an hour there.

Next, we went to the James A. Garfield Historic Site in Mentor, Ohio, where he and his family had a farm. The tour guide explained Garfield's upbringing and how intelligent he was and how he excelled at everything he did. He was a farmer, a university professor and even a Major General during the Civil War!

After the war he became a politician and ran his 1880 presidential campaign from his Front Porch with newsmen camped out in the field in front of his house, waiting for him to come out and answer questions. Unfortunately, after he won



the presidency, he was shot by a disgruntled supporter who was unhappy because he wasn't able to secure a job working for the government. Garfield suffered for over 80 days before succumbing to his infected wounds on September 19, 1880. If you go to Ohio, be sure to visit this national historic site.

We had a box lunch on the run on our way to the Woodland Cemetery, where many Civil War Veterans are buried. At the cemetery is also located James Garfield's Memorial burial site. We finished the tour back at the Soldiers and Sailors Monument with drinks and light snacks. Returned to the hotel around 8:00 p.m.-a long day . . .

The next day, on Friday, August 9th, was our first day of business. 203 Brothers from around the country attended this Encampment, with our Department well represented with 10 Brothers. Our Department was given a streamer for our Department flag for contributing \$500 (from an anonymous Department Brother) to the

Benjamin Franklin Stephenson Foundation, and Brothers Dean Enderlin, PDC, Dan Earl, PCC, and Frank Avila, PCC, all receiving various Certificates of Appreciation for their work on various National Committees.

Various recommendations were proposed by the outgoing officers and voted on by those in attendance. (I might add here that, if you ever attend a National Encampment, make sure you bring your current SUVCW membership card as it was checked on the first day).

Our Auxiliary Sisters (ASUVCW) also had their National Encampment in another room and one of them gave a presentation about the, "Wags4Warriors" Program that helps train and supply dogs for veterans. It costs \$4,500 to train each dog, and upon completion of training, the *dog* chooses the veteran. Brothers "passed the hat" and collected \$1,001, to help train a dog, which was greeted with tears of appreciation from our Sister when she came back later.

One of the guests at our Encampment was Paul Gramling, the National Commander of the Sons of Confederate Veterans (SCV). He and C-in-C Shaw exchanged pleasantries and gifts. Commander Gramling also spoke briefly at our Saturday night Banquet Dinner.

Later, on Friday evening, we had our Campfire. The Department of Ohio did an excellent job by having a local Civil War Brass Band perform songs from the Civil War era. The presentation lasted over an hour and was then followed by each Department giving parting gifts to the outgoing C-in-C, Donald Shaw.

The next day, on Saturday the 10th, was the conclusion of Old and New Business, followed by the election of new Officers. With the completion of his one year term, C-in-C Shaw was given a hearty applause and a standing ovation. Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief (SVC-in-C) Edward J. Norris, PDC, ran unopposed and was elected the new C-in-C, and likewise, Junior Vice Commander-in-Chief (JVC-in-C) Brian Pierson, PDC, ran unopposed and became the new SVC-in-C. There were two nominees for the position of JVC-in-C, with our Department's choice of Brother Michael A. Paquette, PDC, from the Department of the Chesapeake winning the election.

Brothers were told that the 2020 Encampment will be held in Atlanta, Georgia, and that the 2021 Encampment will be held in St. Louis, Missouri. For this year's encampment, several Brothers added on additional travel plans in the area, either for vacations, to see relatives, or to visit their SUVCW relatives' grave sites. Something to think about if you have an idea to attend a National Encampment in the future...

We were also reminded that, "it is an honor" to host a National Encampment. Our department last held a National Encampment in 2012 in Los Angeles. Since so many encampments are held back East, maybe it's time we think about doing it again,

After the close of business Saturday we had our Banquet Dinner, which cost \$40. If you go,

make sure you coordinate your seating arrangements as soon as the dining room doors open, as we were almost not able to sit with fellow Department Brothers.

On Sunday, the 11th, church services were offered and many participants caught their flights home. For your future reference, the total cost of my going to this encampment, which included the cost of round-trip airfare to Cleveland, 4 nights in the hotel, tour and banquet costs, plus additional food costs, was about \$1,675.

I hope all of you consider going to a future National Encampment and I am happy to answer any additional questions you may have about this annual and interesting event.



G.A.R. Highway Signs

At one time, the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) Highway stretched across the United States beginning in Provincetown, Massachusetts and running through Bishop, California and ending in Long Beach. Route 6, the longest transcontinental highway was named in honor of the G.A.R.

After the passing of the GAR 1956 and fading interest and more modern thoroughfares and freeways, the GAR highway has been bypassed in many areas. Not many people even know that the highway existed.

General Rosecrans Camp 2 GAR Highway Officer Ron Black has been working with Cal-Trans to see about having highway signs indicating Route 6 as the GAR highway replaced to where they were once erected and are now missing.

Last Spring Brother Black received confirmation that Cal-Trans had installed two GAR highway signs, replicas of the originals, one at the south bound Interstate 5 at the Los Angeles City limits sign and another on south bound CA-14.
