June 16, 1858 – Accepting the Illinois Republican Party's nomination for the U.S. Senate, Abraham Lincoln said the slavery issue had to be resolved, declaring, "A house divided against itself cannot stand." June 19, 1865 – Union Troops arrived in Galveston, Texas, with news that the Civil War was over and that all remaining slaves in Texas were free - an event celebrated to this day as "Juneteenth."

Southwest Civil War Symposium

On February 1st, several of Camp 18 Brothers joined Brother Bodie Crowder who was the Master of Ceremonies at his 2nd annual Southwest Civil War Symposium held at ESRI Cafe in Redlands. The program was well organized and had five very interesting guest speakers.

The first speaker was David Dixon, who spoke about, "Emotions and Allegiance: Loyalty and Dissent in the Confederacy." He explained that Loyalty, like Love, needs to be reciprocal and that the government must reciprocate the loyalty of the soldier. He also explained that, "Emotion is the opposite of Reason" and that both sides of the Civil War conflict accused the other of, "infidelity".

The second speaker was Bruce Smith, who talked about, "Life in the saddle and how the Union Cavalry-

men lived and fought from the back of a horse." His perspective was especially poignant since he is a retired policeman who rode a horse.

The third speaker, Larry Burgess, discussed "The Civil War's Diverse Parts, and explained the 13th and 14th Amendments. He discussed the Articles of Secession and how the issue of Slavery was the core issue that led to the start of the Civil War.

Mark McGuire was the fourth speaker

and gave an interesting discussion about "The Limits of Executive Discretion in Times of Crisis". He discussed how Lincoln directed his Attorney General to suspend "Habeas Corpus" (can't be held without due process of law and evidence) and that he also limited Freedom of the Press by shutting down newspapers that supported the South's views. He explained that such actions were allowed "to save the Union" and not for political advantage.

The last speaker was Eric Wittenberg, who spoke about "Sherman's Carolinas Campaign of 1865". He explained that Sherman's Army invaded Georgia and South Carolina with very little supplies and lived off the land of the civilian population. He also explained how important it was for Sherman's engineers to build roads over the swamps that they often encountered.

For those of you who were not able to attend this year's Symposium, I would encourage you to consider going next year. The \$50 (\$40 if prepaid) admission fee included a tasty lunch and made for a very interesting and enjoyable Saturday afternoon.

A hearty "Congratulations" to Brother Bodie is in order for organizing and presenting this wonderful program. We will be looking forward to next year's presentation as this youngest of our Brothers continues to impress us with his interest and knowledge of the Civil War well beyond his years.

Civil War veteran.

Irene Triplett received a monthly check for \$73.13 from the Department of Veterans Affairs as her father, Mose Triplett, was a Union Civil War Veteran. Mose Triplett deserted the Confederate army just before the battle of Gettysburg in 1863 and later joined the 3rd North Carolina Mounted Infantry, a Union Regiment.

Mose Triplett married Elida Hall, his second wife and Irene Triplett's mother, in 1924. Mose was nearly 50 years older than Elida, and he was weeks away from turning 84 when Irene Triplett was born in 1930.

Mose Triplett died in 1938, just a few days after returning from the 75th anniversary reunion of the Battle of Gettysburg.

Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War Commander-in-Chief Ed Norris issued General Order #26 confirming the passing of Sister Irene Triplett and ordered that the National web site, Department and Camp Charters should be draped in black and that membership badges should be attached with a black mourning ribbon for a period of 30 days or till July 2nd 2020.



Since we were unable to have our regular Memorial Day Ceremony this year due to the Corona Virus, I decided to go to Evergreen

Cemetery on Saturday, May 30th to, "Keep Green the Memory of those who fought to save our Union". As they did shortly at the end of the Civil War, I placed flowers at several of the graves at the G.A.R. Circle there. I was in uniform and thought that anyone seeing me there might report that, "a ghost" had been seen near the grave sites of those veterans of the Union who were buried there and had photographic proof. As far as I know I was the only one taking any pictures. The only other visitor at the cemetery was a bicyclist bringing flowers to the grave of a loved one.



While placing the flowers on each grave, (*shown in the photo above*) I felt transported back to an earlier time when there was no modern day "Memorial Day" and that the custom was called, "Decoration Day". I had no flags to put on the graves, but that made it all the more authentic as I don't think that flags were put on the graves of the Union Veterans in the 19th century.

I had a moment of silence and said a prayer, thanking those veterans buried there for their bravery and sacrifices that they had made to keep our Union whole, and hoping that, if the time should ever come again, that I would be willing to make the same sacrifices that they made.
