

The Camp meeting on August 23,03 was a big success. I want to thank all Camp Brothers for your dedication to the SUVCW. Organizing the General William Passmore Carlin was an enjoyable experience for me. You are all gentleman and considerate Brothers, each and everyone of you.

This Camp will always perpetuate the memory of the Grand Army of the Republic and the men who served the Union 1861 to 1865. We Camp Brothers will do honor to all who have patriotically served our country in any war, to teach patriotism, and the duties of citizenship, the true history of our country, and the love and honor of our flag; to oppose every tendency or movement that would weaken loyalty to, or make for the destruction or impairment of our constitutional Union. We will inculcate and broadly sustain the American principles of representative government, of equal rights, and of impartial justice for all. We join as Brothers in this patriotic and fraternal Order In Fraternity, Charity, and Loyality.

I recently bought a book, "The Memoirs of Brigadier General William Passmore Carlin U.S.A." In Chapter One, Pages 26 and 27,"The entire regiment, for the first time in the eight years to which I had belonged to it, was concentrated at Fort Bridger in August or September of 1858, and we took up march for California, to which department the regiment was ordered after the settlement of the Mormon troubles. Marching via Soda Springs to Humboldt River we made our regular state of twenty miles a day-sometimes more if necessary to find a good campground. Crossing Humboldt Desert and ascending Carson River to Carson City we reached the first white settlement. Our route took us through Carson Valley to Genoa and a few miles above that village, where we encamped.;

The regiment crossed the Sierra Nevada Mountains to a depth of two feet but they marched on to Placerville, the Russian River, and Round Valley California. Then to Fort Bragg for the rest of the year.

Just think Brothers, when we selected our Camp name we had no idea that William Passmore Carlin marched through the Carson Valley, perhapes where our Camp Headquarters is located.

Union Regimental Histories Nevada 1st. Battalion Cavalry

Organized at Fort Churchill, California, June 22, 1863. Attached to District of Utah and District of California, Dept. of the Pacific.

Companies "A" and "B" moved to Camp Douglass, near Salt Lake City, Utah, September 29, 1863, Duty there and at Camp Connor, Utah, until June, 1864. Company "B" moved to Unitah Valley, Utah, May 2, 1864; thence to Fort Bridger, Utah, August 1, 1864. Company "A" moved to Fort Bridger, Utah, June 1864, and engaged in scouting and protecting emigrants and prospectors.

Companies "C" "D" "E" and "F" at Fort Churchill, Cal. Until July,1864. Expedition from Fort Churchill to Humboldt River, Nevada, June 8-August 9, 1864. Duty scouting in the Smoke Creek District (Co. "D"). Companies "C" and "F" ordered to Camp Douglass, near Salt Lake City, Utah, July 28, 1864. Companies "D" and "E" remained at Fort Churchill, operating in the Humboldt District until muster out. Expedition to Pyramid Lake and Walkers Lake March 12-19, 1865 (Cos. "D", "E"). Skirmish at Mud Lake March 14, 1865 (Cos. "D", "E"), Musterd out July 21, 1866.

1st. Battalion Infantry

Organized at Fort Churchill, California, December 24, 1863. Attached to District of California, Dept. of the Pacific.

Company "A" on duty at Fort Churchill until July 28, 1864. Moved to Smoky Creek Region July 28, returning to Fort Churchill October 23, 1864, and duty there until December, 1865. Expedition from Fort Churchill to Pyramid Lake and Walkers Lake March 12-19, 1865.

Company "B" at Fort Churchill until July 28, 1884. Ordered to Fort Ruby, Nevada, July 28, 1864, and duty there until December, 1865. Expedition from Fort Ruby to Humboldt Valley, Nevada, May 25-June 15, 1865. Skirmish at Austin May29. Company "C" at Fort Churchill until December 7, 1864. Ordered to Camp Independence.



All Camp members are encouraged by the Camp Commander to be a candidate for a Camp 25 Elected Officers Office, including Camp Commander, Sr. Vice Commander, Jr. Vice Commander, Secretary, Treasurer, and three member Camp Council. Please notify the Camp Commander before September 20, 2003

Election for Elected Camp 25 Officers will be held December 2003 at the Camp 25 Camp Meeting held at 1305 Wheeler Way, Gardnerville Nevada-89460. All candidates must be present at the December Camp meeting. The December Camp meeting time and date will be agreed upon by Camp Brothers at the October 4th. Camp meeting. If for some reason you cant attend the Oct.4th Camp meeting please notify the Camp Commander before Sept. 20th, 03 with dates in December that is open for you to attend a Camp meeting during December so Brothers can consider the date and time for the December Camp meeting.(Note) "There will be an election of Camp Officers during the Dec. Camp meeting". (Article IX, Sec. 2-Elections, Camp ByLaws, "The elected Camp Officers shall be elected at a regular meeting of the Camp between the first meeting in October and the first meeting in December, inclusive, the date to be determined by a majority vote of the Camp members present, at no later than the meeting previous to that at which the election is to be held. Advance notice of the nominations and elections meetings shall be provided to all Brothers. On assuming office, the Commander shall appoint all other Camp Officers.")

Installation of Camp Officers: The Camp Commander will request Brother Brad Schall-Commander of California and Pacific, SUVCW to be the Installing Officer during the December Camp meeting. (Article IX, Sec. 4-Installation, Camp ByLaws, "The elected Camp Officers shall be installed at a regular meeting of the Camp to be held between the first meeting in November, and the first meeting in the following January, inclusive, by a person designated by the Department Commander.")



"Will You Give Us Our Whisky Now?"

The Taking of Burnside's Bridge at Intietam, September 17, 1862

It was nearly 1:00 p.m., September 17, 1862. The rumbling of artillery and rattle of musketry to the north had been going on for six hours now and word had reached Colonel Edward Ferrero that Major General Burnside wanted his troops across this stone bridge spanning Antietam Creek.

Some of Robert E. Lee's Georgians were dug in on the opposite bank making the bridge a focal point for their fire. The Union assault had been held up since 10:00 that morning. Now, something must be done.

The 51st Pennsylvania and the 51st New York had nearly gotten into position. The Pennsylvanians were particularly surly that afternoon; for misconduct on the march, their whisky ration had been cut. Ferrero spoke to them: "It is General Burnside's special request that the two 51sts take the bridge. Will you do it?"

The silence was broken by one of the Pennsylvanians making a soldier's bargain: "Will you give us our whisky, Colonel, if we take it?"

"Yes, by God!" The colonel sealed the pact. "You shall have all you want, if you take that bridge."

Led by Captain William Allabaugh, three color bearers and their guard, and their Colonel John Hartranft, they stormed the bridge and established a Union foothold on that end of the field. The Battle of Antietam would become the bloodiest single day in American military history.
