JERRY REYNOLDS AND THE MEDAL OF HONOR

December 19, 2016

On December 19, 2016, Jerry Reynolds of Elko received a replacement Medal of Honor from Congressman Mark Amodei, R-NV, to replace one issued to his grandfather for service in the Indian Wars. About two dozen or so people attended including Camp 25 Senior Vice Commander and Historian David A. Davis. Under the alias Robert Smith, Jerry's grandfather Harry Reynolds was a private in Troop M, 3rd U.S. Cavalry during the Indian Wars, and had been a Confederate drummer boy during the Civil War. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for bravery in action at Slim Buttes, Dakota Territory on Sept. 9, 1876. However, he never knew of the award before passing away on January 5, 1930, and being buried in the Elko City Cemetery. Gail Alvarez, president of the Medal of Honor Historical Society, had originally contacted our now deceased former Camp Commander John Riggs about Harry Reynolds. Carlin Camp 25 worked with Gail in finding information on Robert Smith/Harry Reynolds for two years, and contacted Jerry about it. In 2012, Carlin Camp 25, with help from the Department of the Pacific, Federal Battalion Reenactors (DPFBR), Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 2350, the Elko High School band, and others, held a memorial service at the Elko City Cemetery honoring Harry Reynolds. Most of this has written up in detail in the November 2012 issue of the Carlin Dispatch. Since the Medal of Honor had never been presented, in June 2016, Jerry Reynolds requested assistance from Congressman Amodei's office in an effort to obtain a Medal of Honor. Congressman Amodei's staff contacted the Army's Command Awards and Decorations Branch on Jerry's behalf, and on October 14, 2016, the Branch announced they would be proud to provide the family with a new Medal of Honor as a symbol of the one earned but never presented so many years ago.

2016 CHAPLAIN'S REPORT AND SVR REPORT

2016 proved to be another busy year for Camp 25's Chaplain and SVR Battery. In March, the Chaplain was invited to conduct a Civil War Church Call at the Annual Calico Reenactment (Near Barstow, CA). Three Chaplains were involved in the service, providing a varied insight to the service. Camp 25's Chaplain also participated in the battle reenactments as a Dismounted Union Cavalry Trooper.

In May 2016, the Chaplain was invited to participate in Camp 12's (Las Vegas) annual Memorial Day Ceremony. This was the second year in which we were able to be represented at this event.

In September 2016, the SVR was invited to conduct a presentation on Civil War field artillery at the Summit Leadership Academy in Hesperia, CA. Students were in the process of learning about various Indian Wars, and the presentation revolved around the Modoc War in California & Oregon where Civil War US Major General E.R.S. Canby was killed. The SVR Battery demonstrated the use of the Coehorn Mortar to the students and discussed operations of Mountain Howitzers and Mortars.

In October 2016, Chaplain Eder participated in the Church Call at the annual Spring Mountain Ranch reenactment. The message delivered revolved around "Death of a Loved One" and tied in death during the war to modern day loss in our own families. The SVR Battery then took the field with VR Captain Wayne Eder and SVR Sergeant Vincent Vitale firing the Coehorn Mortar as part of the Union gun line during the reenactment.

Multiple events are scheduled throughout Southern Nevada and Southern California for 2017 in which the SVR Battery will be represented.

Based upon operational needs of the Camp, Chaplain Eder is respectfully requesting that he be made "Honorary Chaplain" for Camp 25 to continue the work he has started in the South on behalf of Camp 25 for the last two years, while a regular Chaplain be appointed to Camp 25. The SVR Battery needs to decide if they wish to be carried on paper as we have done for the last two years with operations conducted in the

South; or if the Camp wants to disband the Battery. To date, the battery has participated in multiple events with members in the Camp in Reno participating in various reenactments in that area.

MEETING MINUTES OCTOBER 9, 2016

MEETING MINUTES – S.U.V.C.W. Camp 25

October 9, 2016 - VFW Hall (Post 9211), 255 VFW Historic Lane, Reno, NV

1:19 pm – Meeting Called to Order by Commander Ed Carson

1:20 pm - Pledge of Allegiance led by Vcmdr R. Linscott

1:21 pm - Invocation by Cdr Ed Carson

1:22 pm - Introduction of Guests Fran Tryon and Mike Craeger.

Members Present (signed in): Frank Wood, James J. Ferrigan, Brian Worcester, David A. Davis, Edward G. Carson, Ray Ahrenholtz, and Roger Linscott

Guest Speaker, Fran Tryon of the **Hillside Cemetery Preservation Foundation** gave a very informative presentation on the current state of affairs at the Hillside Cemetery, and discussed efforts to preserve the gravesite and remains located within its boundaries. She said that the owner of the cemetery, Drew Lawton had repeated his 2000 attempt to exhume the human remains at the cemetery, but that this attempt had been forestalled by public outcry & resistance. She mentioned that the effort to convert the cemetery will probably continue by Drew Lawton, and that the Hillside Cemetery Preservation Foundation was started by her to protect the gravesites and those interred there. Fran gave a listing of all 26 of the known veterans, from the civil war to WWI, that have been interred at the cemetery. She mentioned during her presentation that she would welcome any camp support and volunteer efforts in the maintenance and defense of the cemetery, and acknowledged the worthy work of Guest Mike Craeger in keeping the weeds clear on the grounds, and mentioned that the TKE fraternity has figuratively taken ownership of the grounds, cleaning and keeping a watchful eye on it. Fran Tryon is the founder and president of the H.C.P.L. organization; for more information, her email address is: frannyt49@gmail.com and is also available on *FACEBOOK*. Her cell phone is (775) 853-6673, and her home phone is (775) 440-1495. Her presentation coincides with the History and Memorials Report submitted by Brother David Davis.

Reno Veterans Day Parade planning was addressed by Cdr Ed Carson, who asked whether anyone besides himself would like to undertake the task of submitting the camp's entry form for the parade. Since there were no takers, he said that he would again submit the camp's entry form. At this time he mentioned that in last year's parade there was a problem with "civilian" participants crossing in front of vehicles, and that to address that and "safety first", those pedestrians would be positioned ahead of the entries near the banner. Flag carriers were discussed with brother Brian Worcester, and because there are a number

unaccounted for, he said that an inventory of these carriers would be made. Brother Frank Wood announced that following the Veterans Day Parade, the camp's participants were invited for hot dogs & hamburgers at the VFW Hall.

Nevada Day Parade was addressed by Cdr Ed Carson, and brother David Davis reported that he had once again submitted the camp's parade entry form and entry fee. He said that the camp would proceed as in the past, with himself in a camp 25 vehicle, followed by brother Robert Burr and his marching soldier reenactor group, which would be followed by the horse cavalry troops. Brother Brian Worcester made a motion that brother Davis be compensated by the camp for the parade entry fee of \$70; the motion seconded by brother Ray Arenholtz, motion carried.

History & Memorials Report was submitted as noted previously, by brother David Davis. He discussed Fran Tryon's presentation, and local parades, and that the formerly mentioned box of history type books were donated to St Mary's Church, where Pat Neylan, an acquaintance of the camp from Dayton Valley Days, is a Docent. Most of the books were put into the church's collection, and brother Burr said he would take the remainder.

New Business:

Wreaths Across America was addressed by brother Brian Worcester. He said that the Founders & Patriots of America will make its contribution again this year, and asked whether there was any interest by the camp to make a contribution as well. He suggested an amount of \$60. During discussion it was determined that the current balance in the treasury is in excess of \$600, and Cdr Carson said that 10% of the camp's funds (\$60) could be given to the WAA fund. R. Linscott made the motion to donate \$60 to WWA, and brother Arenholtz seconded, and the motion carried. Brother Worcester advised R. Linscott to request Treasurer Hess to make the check for WAA and send it to the proper recipient. (This was done.) The WWA event will be held on Saturday, December 17, at the N. Nevada Veterans Memorial Cemetery in Fernley, starting at 9:00 a.m.

Next Meeting Date: December 11, 2016 was chosen for the next meeting date, confirmed by brother Frank Wood for the availability of the VFW Hall.

Previous Meeting Minutes – Brother Worcester made a motion to accept the previous meeting's minutes; brother Ray Arenholtz seconded, motion carried.

Motion for adjournment by brother Worcester; seconded by brother Arenholtz; motion carried.

HISTORY AND MEMORIALS REPORT

October 9, 2016

HILLSIDE CEMETERIES

I have been reporting on the Hillside Cemetery at the last few meetings. As noted in my reports at the last few meetings, articles of incorporation were filed for the Hillside Cemetery Preservation Foundation. The purpose of this foundation will be to raise money for the preservation and eventual acquisition of the Hillside Cemetery. With the okay from Drew Lawton and some of the families who own the plots, Frances Tryon has been cleaning up the graves for the last several years with some help of volunteers. She and others have also been researching those buried there as well as the history of the cemetery. She has been a driving force behind getting the foundation set up. Fran has identified at least 22 veterans buried in the Hillside Cemetery some of which are Civil War veterans.

Drew Lawton owns and operates Sierra Memorial Gardens, which owns the Hillside Cemetery and the Sierra Memorial Gardens veterans' cemetery in Lemmon Valley. A Sacramento developer has an option agreement with Mr. Lawton through 2018 to acquire Hillside, move the bodies, and build upscale housing there. A state law was passed some years ago to allow this to happen at Hillside, and this law may circumvent the laws dealing with the removal of bodies that died from communicable diseases. At least one person there died from anthrax. Mr. Lawton served notice in September that he was going exercise his right under that law and move about 1,000 bodies from the southern 5 acres of the cemetery to northern 2 acres,

which has about 400 bodies. The plan was "suspended" after a public uproar. Mrs. Tryon is scheduled to give an update at today's meeting.

DONATED BOOKS AND OTHER THINGS

As voted on by the Camp at the last meeting, I took the box of donated books to Pat Nylen, who docents at the St. Mary in the Mountains Catholic Church museum in Virginia City. The museum has a Civil War section. Pat was able to use most of the books for their collection and has sent us a thank you note. I will retrieve the few books and videos not used. I also visited the Civil War re-enactors camps at Dayton Valley Days and the Celtic Festival at Bartley Ranch Park.

PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTOR'S REPORT

October 9, 2016

On October 19, 1863 General William Rosecrans was relieved of duty and General Ulysses S. Grant assumed Command of the Army of the Cumberland with George Thomas and on October 21st General Grant leaves Bridgeport, Alabama to take command of troops in the battle for Chattanooga, TN. Chattanooga was a vital rail hub with railroad lines going north toward Nashville and Knoxville heading south to Atlanta, before Grant assumed command General Rosecrans bottled Braxton Bragg and his Tennessee army and for a brief time they abandoned Chattanooga and eventually fought at Chickamauga where the Confederates had a temporary victory. In November General Grant led the Union Army to a successful outcome at Chattanooga and to eventually win the American Civil War in 1865.



MEETING MINUTES

December 11, 2016

Minutes of the camp meeting
Sunday, DECEMBER 11, 2016 at 1300 HOURS
VFW Hall, 255 Veterans Historic Way, Reno, NV

I. Opening

1. The meeting was called to order by Commander Carson at 13:13 hours.
2. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Commander Carson.
3. Invocation was led by Commander Carson.
4. Members in attendance were: Col. Edward Carson, David Davis, Tyrone Davis, David Hess, Frank Whitman, Francis Wood and Brian Worcester.

II. Secretary/Treasurer's Report--Brother David Hess

1. Secretary Hess summarized the minutes of the September meeting, which were taken by Roger Linscott, and previously distributed by email. Hess asked for any changes. Being none, it was **MOVED** (Whitman) and **SECONDED** (Worcester) that the Minutes of the September meeting be accepted as presented. The motion passed unanimously.

2. Treasurer Hess presented the financial statements as of December 11 which were submitted by email prior to the meeting. Hess asked for any questions. Being none it was MOVED (Whitman) and SECONDED (Worcester) that the financial statements be accepted as presented. The motion passed unanimously.

III. Commander's Report—Brother Edward Carson

1. Veteran's Day Parade--11 Nov.--Discussion centered on the change in our parade position. This year we were unit No. 24 where in the past we had been No. 1 or 2. There was no issues that arose as a result of the change in position, and it is anticipated that we will have a similar position next year should we choose to participate.

It was noted that included as members of are "unit" are the SAR Color Guard, Fifes & Drums of Nevada and Civil War Re-enactor groups. We were also joined by the DAR and DUVCW but is was not clear if they registered with our unit or separately.

2. Nevada Day Parade--The discussion centered on the length of the parade, but it was not so long as to prevent future participation in the parade.

3. Wreaths Across America--This event will take place on Saturday, December 17, and SUVCW members were encouraged to participate.

IV. Old Business and New Business

A. There was no Old Business.

B. New Business.

1. Brother Francis Woods announced that he may be resigning his position as Senior Vice Commander of the VFW. If this happens he will no longer have access to the keys to our meeting location. It was agreed that if Brother Woods no longer has key access arrangements will need to be made to either access the keys for find another location. Commander Carson said he would look at alternative locations and/or arrangements.

2. Brother Frank Whitman invited Camp members to attend the annual "Trappers Rendezvous" to be held in Austin in July. Frank said final plans will be made in February, and he will let us know if we can set up an information booth or distribute information to attendees. We will take this subject up again at our February meeting.

3. Brother Whitman asked if Camp 25 was going to do something in observance of Abraham Lincoln's Birthday (February 12). There was some discussion on what the Camp has done in the past and Brother Worcester noted that in the past we have made a donation to the VFW for heating. The purpose of the donation is to show our appreciation for making the space available for our meetings. It was the general consensus that this was worth repeating. It was MOVED (Worcester) and SECONDED (Whitman) to donate \$50 in January to the VFW for heating. The motion PASSED unanimously. Brother Hess was instructed to issue a check for \$50 in January.

4. Commander Carson discussed the desirability of acquiring a cannon. There was a brief discussion on the logistics, sources and costs of acquiring a cannon and the discussion ended with Commander Carson saying he would look further into the possibilities.

V. Patriotic Instructor's Report--Brother Tyrone Davis

1. Brother Tyrone Davis provided a written and oral report on post-Gettysburg battles that took place around the end of 1863 (see EXHIBIT 1).

VI. History and Memorials Report—Brother David A. Davis

1. Brother David Davis provided a written and oral presentation on the history of the Isaac Crist Camp 28 (SUVCW), a predecessor to Camp 25. He also provided an update on the GAR Cemetery (see EXHIBIT 2).

VII. Senior Vice Commanders Report--Brother David Davis

1. Brother Davis reported that notices of the meeting were posted in the calendars of local media.

*The new position of ROTC/JROTC Coordinator was approved on the provision that the medals and certificates could be obtained at no cost to the Camp. It was the opinion of Commander Carson that this was the case, but he will confirm it with National and report back to the Camp at the February meeting.

HISTORY AND MEMORIALS REPORT

December 11, 2016

ISAAC CRIST CAMP 28

Over the years, I have reported from time to time on our predecessor camp, the Isaac Crist Camp 28. The Camp was chartered October 1, 1967, and went out of existence shortly after Memorial Day in 1979. They lasted 12 years, and it should be noted that Carlin Camp 25 is now at 13 years. The Crist Camp was also concurrent with the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War Johanna Shine Tent 82, which lasted from 1960 to 1990. I do have a folder of newspaper articles and other material collected over the years on both entities. Recently, I did a search on newspapers.com for articles I missed, and I brought a binder with the results. Much of it has to do with Memorial Day activities. However, a few new finds can be highlighted. The original charter had 30 charter members and included U.S. Senator Alan Bible and Reno police Chief William Brodhead. The first commander was University of Nevada, Reno, Professor J.E. "Doc" Martie, who also went on to be Department of California and Pacific Commander in 1969. John N. McCarthy was camp commander in 1968, and William R. Thomas was camp commander in 1969 through 1971. Ronald Lienau was camp commander in 1973 and 1975 through 1977. Ryall Bowker was camp commander in 1979, and apparently the last one. John Riggs met Ronald Lienau at the V.A. Hospital in 2011, but the man was not

well and had memory problems at that time. He did say the Crist Camp essentially fell apart as members lost interest or moved away, and they were never able to consistently bring in new members.

The Crist Camp 28 and Shine Tent 82 were involved in the restoration of the G.A.R Mitchel Post 69 Cemetery at Hillside, and a 1966 article notes a Grand Army Restoration Fund set up by the Shine Tent 82 with the cooperation of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of World War I, and others. John N. McCarthy was the chairman of the fund. After the demise of Crist Camp 28, William Thomas, who was a retired safety consultant, continued to personally look after the cemetery into the 1990s. Curiously, a Reno Gazette-Journal dated November 26, 1987, about him notes that the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War held the deed to the cemetery. My research has been that the G.A.R. Post 69 turned the deed over the Women's Relief Corps in 1931, and they turned it over to the Barry Camp 1 of the United Spanish War Veterans in 1955. The trail went cold after that.

G.A.R. CEMETERY KEY

A month or so ago, a Nevada Historical Society docent gave me an envelope containing old keys to the G.A.R Mitchel Post 69 Cemetery at Hillside and paperwork for the cremains of Cyril Morrell Beebe in the cemetery and for the cremains of Fern Douglas Beebe. Kelly Thomas was the keeper of the keys. The 1971 Reno Directory shows Kelly Thomas living at the same address as William Thomas, a safety consultant (father-son?).
