Of particular note was the addition of cavalryman **DAN BURZ**, mounted upon his fine steed, which was a hit with both the public and the participants.


The firing detail consisted of five Springfield and Enfield muskets. As usual, the Civil War era

Camp Holds Remembrance Day Observance

Each November the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War organizes the Remembrance Day Parade in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, commemorating the deliverance of the Gettysburg Address by President Abraham Lincoln during the dedication of the National Cemetery in 1863. While members of the Allied Orders and reenacting groups are encouraged to participate, it is not always practical for those in the West to do so. Because of this, the Phil Sheridan Camp No. 4 sponsored its own

With the assistance of the Boy Scouts of America, a United States Flag was placed on each of the over 420 graves in the Grand Army of the Republic burial plot. Camp Commander FRANK C. AVILA lead the ceremony, with **DANIEL M. BUNNELL PDC** serving as Chaplain. Past Department Commander TAD D. CAMPBELL delivered greetings from the Department of California and Pacific and Department President RACHELLE M. CAMPBELL did likewise for the Auxiliary to Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. SHARON POPE of the Kate B. Sherwood Tent No. 89 spoke on behalf of the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War. Brother RICHARD A. STALEY, presenting an impression of Comrade Charles L. Burdick of the Sheridan-Dix Post No. 7, delivered a stirring rendition of the Gettysburg Address. The Camp was greatly assisted by the American Legion District 13 Honor Guard, which provided a firing detail for the event. Special thanks are also extended to Brother **ROBERT J.** KADLEC PCC, who, as chairman of the Camp's Ceremonial Observances Committee, was instrumental in organizing the event. Plans are underway for next year's observance, at which it is hoped that a sign designating the original 1880 G.A.R. plot will be dedicated.

MARCY LYNN BUNNELL, a Charter member of both the Dr. Mary E. Walker Auxiliary No. 52 and the Ivy Stiers Auxiliary No. 23, and wife of Brother DANIEL M. BUNNELL (Past Camp Commander and Past Department Commander) passed away unexpectedly in her sleep on December 7, 2008 at their home in Paradise, California. The cause of death has yet to be determined. Marcy was 53 years old and a native of San José, California. At the time of her death she was serving as a Trustee for Auxiliary No. 52 and the Department of California and Pacific. She had also served Auxiliary No. 52 at various times as Vice-President, Chaplain, and Patriotic Instructor and had several times been a Delegate to ASUVCW National Encampments. A memorial service has already been held. The Camp and Auxiliary extend their condolences to Brother Bunnell and his family.

Dr. Walker's Remedies

News from Dr. Mary E. Walker Auxiliary No. 52

The War Between the States was also a war between brothers, cousins, friends and neighbors - and some of them were women. We know from certain

military records, antique books, and some newer books, that women served as nurses, vivandieres, sutlers, and as Union and Confederate soldiers, and even spies. A vivandiere, by the way, is a French army term applied to women who provided food, provisions, and liqueurs to soldiers. Sutlers were peddlers who sold goods to military units in the field. One woman served without pay as a physician, acted as a spy, and was a prisoner of war. Do you know her name? That's right — Dr. Mary Edwards Walker!

Perhaps the most poignant story about women in the Civil War is one told in the book Women in War, 1866, by Frank Moore. In 1863, at age 19, a woman known only as Emily, ran away from home and joined the drum corps of a Michigan Regiment. The regiment was sent to Tennessee and during the struggle for Chattanooga a minié ball pierced the side of the young soldier. Her wound was fatal and her sex was disclosed. At first she refused to give her real name, but as she lay dying she consented to dictate a telegram to her father in Brooklyn — Forgive your dying daughter. I have but a few moments to live. My native soil drinks my blood. I expected to deliver my country but the fates would not have it so. I am content to die. Pray forgive me..... Emily.

Did You Know?

During the winter of 1862-63 Colonel John T. Wilder was given the unenviable task of chasing down Morgan's cavalry with regular infantry. Seeing the futility of the situation and being a progressive commander, Colonel Wilder requested that his infantry units be mounted. Federal cavalry was in short supply at this point in the war and Colonel Wilder was determined to overcome this problem. Wilder's first plan was to mount some of his regiment on the mules used to pull the regimental supply wagons. This proved disastrous to the poor souls attempting this, but very humorous for their comrades. Undeterred, Wilder requested permission to mount his regiment and in February of 1863 permission was granted. Wilder now went about the task of "acquiring" horses and mules for his men. He also went about equipping his men with the most advanced firearm available. This was the Spencer rifle - a seven shot, metallic cartridge, repeating rifle. In the hands of his regiments it turned the tide of a number of major engagements.

Wilder's brigade, also known as the "Hatchet Brigade" and the "Lightning Brigade", proved themselves in battle during the Tullahoma campaign. They went on to prove themselves in the capture of Chattanooga, the battle of Chickamauga, the Atlanta campaign, Wilson's Raid and the capture of Macon.

The Brigade consisted of the 17th and 72nd Indiana, the 123rd, 98th and 92nd Illinois and the 18th Indiana Artillery Battery.

Private John Henderson Appleton (1832-1911), great-greatgreat-grandfather of Brother **TAD D. CAMPBELL PDC**, was a member of Company E, 17th Indiana Infantry.

MEMBERSHIP ELIGIBILITY

A male descendant, whether through lineal (direct ancestor) or collateral line (uncle) and not less than 14 years of age (6 to 14 years for Juniors), who: (1) is a blood relative (descendant or nephew) of a Soldier, Sailor, Marine or member of the Revenue Cutter Service, who was regularly mustered and served honorably in, was honorably discharged from or died in the service of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps or Revenue Cutter Service of the United States of America or in such state regiments called to active service and was subject to orders of United States general officers, between April 12, 1861 and April 9, 1865; (2) has never been convicted of any infamous or heinous crime and (3) has, or whose ancestor through whom membership is claimed has, never voluntarily borne arms against the government of the United States.
