

<b>Notes:</b> Fountain dedication to veterans of both sides of the Civil War, dedicated August 1876. At the dedication, a blessing was given by both Union and Confederate veterans: "To the boys the fell and to the veterans that made it back to their homes and families, this is for you boys, this is for all of you because we were brothers, in arms." It was reportedly manufactured and shipped from Cincinnati, and cost about \$1,250. The funds were raised by the Healdsburg Ladies of Industry.

<b>Notes:</b> Excerpt from article: <p style="text-align: center;">New Flag Pole Dedicated at Kenwood Patriotic Program</p> <p>A colorful feature of last Sunday, Father's Day, in Warm Springs Park at Kenwood, was the dedicating of a lofty pole and the beautiful American flag which was raised for the first time. Residents of the park and their friends witnessed the dedication and flag raising, and renewed their allegiance to their flag and country.</p> <p>Commander Samuel R. Yoho, former department president of the Grand Army of the Republic of the states of California and Nevada, a former Santa Rosan and sole surviving member of George H. Thomas Post, G.A.R., of San Francisco, presented the flag, a huge and striking emblem. William Eichbaum made and placed the pole, towering 25 feet in the beautiful setting of fine, old trees, amid clinging roses and natural vines. In addition to Commander Yoho and Eichbaum, the assemblage included Mrs. Eichbaum, Mrs. Yoho; Mrs. Alice Newcomb, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eichbaum who now reside permanently in Warm Springs Park; Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Newcomb of San Francisco, the former one of the air wardens in the metropolis; Miss France Gayetti, San Francisco, department treasurer of the Ladies of the Grand Army, and others. Mrs. Alice Newcomb is the president of the Kenwood Women's Club.</p> <p>Commander Yoho and Eichbaum were tendered a vote of thanks for having made possible the attractive flag and pole for the adornment of the Warm Springs Memorial Park.</p>

"The members have voted the money for the tree and chosen the spot where it will stand, and will provide a suitable marker if their plans please the park commission."                      Dedicated on 1 April 1933 in conjunction with Ellsworth Post's annual camp fire (dinner social). The minutes of the Post meeting on that date include the following:                      "Prior to meeting the annual camp fire dinner given by the W.R.C. was enjoyed. After the Post closed they proceeded to Juliard Park where a cedar tree was dedicated to Ellsworth Post by the W.R.C., the Rev. Frank K. Baker a son of Veterans made a wonderful address. The Presentation was made by Elizabeth Leinen, following which Commander Conant thanked the W.R.C. for their kindness. Then a song [about] trees was rendered by South Park School children followed by Manager Charles A. Dunbar on behalf of the City of Santa Rosa thanking the W.R.C."                      No dedicatory plaque was found in a site survey conducted by Dean Enderlin in 2012. The park contains numerous heritage trees (especially redwood), all planted. The land was donated to the City of Santa Rosa in 1931, so this tree was planted during the period when landscaping was underway.</p>

Granite Obelisk with brass plates, coping with cannon ball replicas, and pedestals for three rapid fire cannon now removed. A replacement flag pole was added in 2009, and the pedestals which once supported the Maxim-Nordenfelt guns were replaced in 2010 with new concrete pedestals supporting replica cannon. Work coordinated by the late Bob Voliva of Santa Rosa. Restoration of the plot is considered complete (DAE/10Sept12).
