Associated with Columbia Post, No. 141, GAR.</p> <p>Excerpt from the Sixty-second Congress, Sess. II, Chapter 384, August 24, 1912 [H.R. 24458]: CHAP. 384. – An Act Authorizing the Secretary of War, in his discretion, to deliver to certain cities and towns condemned bronze or brass cannon, with their carriages and outfit of cannon balls, and so forth. <i>Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled,</i> “To the town of Columbia, California, for the use of the Columbia Post, Numbered One hundred and forty-one, Grand Army of the Republic, two condemned mortars or cannon, with a suitable outfit of cannon balls, same to be subject at all times to the order of the Secretary of War.”</p>
