Commander's Corner

Dear Department Brothers,

This is an exciting time, as the Department of California and Pacific has become a recognized as movers and shakers within the National order. We do more on the West Coast than many Departments that have remained active for decades. As the new Department Commander, I would like to take this time to share some of my personal expectations about the Order and goals for the upcoming two years.

I hope to visit with each Camp during my tenure, whether it is at a meeting or event! Although I live in Northern California, I am always just a phone call or email away, and would like to maintain contact with all of the members in our Department. As I said at the Encampment, my biggest expectation is that all Camp and Department business will be conducted with Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty. This is the measure that is applied to all that we do. The Christian Church has 10 commandments, the Boy Scouts have 12 points to the scout law; the founders of our order had the wisdom of only choosing three guiding rules for us to follow. As such, we need to apply all three rules in all situations, and not pick and choose which ones suit us at that moment. If a matter is brought up before the Department's administration for resolution, it will be asked whether all parties have applied these simple guidelines to their actions, and if not, the remedy that is dispensed will surely follow these three simple principles.

Next, I would like each Camp to look at what they are doing to further the Order. In other words, what is the purpose of your Camp? We all know that the purpose of the SUVCW is to "Remember the Boys in Blue." But how does your camp fulfill this purpose. Camps that feel that they are successful define their activities and meetings based upon the needs and interests of their membership.

First, let's look at meetings. Is there a reason to meet monthly, bi-monthly, or quarterly? At the meetings, is there a guest speaker, or is only camp business discussed? Do you meet at a public venue or private home? If it is a



restaurant, is the location semi-private, reasonably priced for all members, and centrally located? Perhaps your meetings can be held in conjunction with events that you participate in?

Do you have a newsletter? It does not have to be fancy. Even a simple word document that informs the members about events, historical data, and other pertinent information will be well received by your members. Again, you have to determine whether you publish monthly, quarterly, or somewhere in between. Do you email it or send by regular post? Your newsletter can probably be posted on your website, along with photos and your schedule. Just let Tad Campbell, the Department Signals Officer, know.

Most important is for your Camp to define what you do. A Camp that meets without a purpose will have trouble recruiting and/or retaining members. Do you have uniformed members that like parades, color guards, or reenacting? Do you have a contingent of genealogists? Is grave registration a passion of some members? Do others like making presentations to students? Or do you just having meetings with presentations, like Civil War Roundtables? You need to determine what your membership wants to do, and then do it with passion and conviction. And sometimes, less is more. A few well-planned and attended events are often better than a busy schedule that stretches your Camp's resources and personnel.

In closing, if, as a Camp, you can define your purpose and activities based upon the needs and abilities of your membership, your contributions will strengthen both your future, as well as the Department and the National Order.

Bob Hope Patriotic Hall Update

Through the years, the 10-story Bob Hope Patriotic Hall has been a familiar sight to those who have traveled the freeways near downtown Los Angeles. Bob Hope Patriotic Hall stands as a historical icon amidst an ever-changing skyline.



The Department of Military and Veterans Affairs began with the purchase of a 3-story abandoned church building located on the side of the present staff's parking lot, prior to 1900. That building was remodeled and became known as Victory Hall. Following World War I, Victory Hall was soon outgrown and plans were laid to create a new multi-story building. Bob Hope Patriotic Hall, as we see it today, was opened to the public in September 1926.

Owned and operated by the County of Los Angeles, Bob Hope Patriotic Hall is a practical and living memorial to veterans. It was dedicated by the Board of Supervisors in 1926. Members of the Grand Army of the Republic, veterans of Indian Wars, Spanish American War veterans and World War I veterans were among the first to use the facilities. The building was designed by Allied Architects Association and has been awarded the Certificate of Honor by the Southern California chapter of the American Society of Architects because of its exceptional merit. Its design is Romanesque with fine vaulted arch construction in the lobby.

Bob Hope Patriotic Hall is home to a treasure of military memorabilia, artifacts and documents from the American Revolution through the recent Middle East War.

The Los Angeles County Chief Executive Officer has issued a report providing an update on the Bob Hope Patriotic Hall General Refurbishment Project. The new projected completion date is now November 30, 2011, and improvement of six months over the report that was received January 1, 2009.

Abraham Lincoln's Favorite Cake

1 10 inch tube cake
90 minutes cook time
30 minutes prep time
Ingredients:
1 cup butter
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
1 teaspoon almond extract
2 cups sugar
3 cups flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup buttermilk
1 1/4 cups toasted blanched almonds
6 large egg whites

Directions:

Beat egg whites til frothy. Add 1 cup sugar gradually til egg whites are stiff peaks.
Fine chop nuts.
Cream the butter and 1 cup suger til light and fluffy.
Sift dry ingredients together.
Add flavoring to milk.
Combine nuts with flour mixture
Add wet to dry by 1/3rds.
Fold egg whites into batter.
Place greased wax paper on tub pan
Turn batter into a 10-inch tube pan.
Bake at 350° about 1 hour or until cake tests done.
Frost with boiled icing.

Ellsworth Camp 23's Lincoln Dinner was held at the famous Washoe House in Petaluma.

So, why did we meet at the Washoe House? It was the site of the so-called "Battle of Washoe House" in April 1865. Immediately following the LINCOLN assassination, the Union militia in Petaluma (known as the Hueston Guard or Emmett Rifles), marched north toward Santa Rosa, intent on retribution. The cause of the military action is somewhat clouded in history, but it is generally believed that their planned attack on Santa Rosa was in response to inflammatory editorials put out by the town's decidedly anti-Union newspaper, the Sonoma Democrat. The "boys," led by MAJOR JAMES ARMSTRONG, marched as far as the Washoe House, where they paused to quench their thirst and brace themselves for battle. Once they'd cooled down a bit with a few beers, the boys forgot what they were marching for and headed back home. Thus ended the glorious "battle" in our own back yard!

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NEVADA DAY, VETERANS DAY, AND WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA ACTIVITIES OF THE CARLIN CAMP 25 OF RENO, NEVADA

Camp Commander **FRANK WOOD**, then-Camp Commander **DAVID A. DAVIS** (PCC), Secretary-Treasurer **BRIAN WORCESTER**, Chaplain **DON GUIDICI**, and **TYRONE DAVIS** represented the General William Passmore Carlin Camp 25 in the Nevada Day/Veterans Day/Wreaths Across America Project parade in Carson City on November 1, 2008. Bro. **GUIDICI**'s ranch pick-up truck with the U.S. and Camp flags posted in the bed of the truck; Camp signs placed on the sides. The Camp was well received by the crowd.

The theme of the parade was motion pictures in Nevada, and the announcement for our entry was:

"General William Passmore Carlin Camp 25 of Reno, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War; David A. Davis, Camp Commander. The Sons of Union Veterans is the heir to the Grand Army of the Republic, or G.A.R., the main Union veterans' organization. The G.A.R. had 18 posts in Nevada including the Custer Post 5 in Carson City and Mitchel Post 69 in Reno. The Sons keep alive the memory of the sacrifices the Boys in Blue made keeping our country together between 1861 and 1865, the theme of many motion pictures over the last one hundred years."

Following the parade, Brothers assembled at the Custer Post 5 Cemetery plot and Civil War monument in the Lone Mountain Cemetery in Carson City where they conducted a brief wreath laying service. Camp 25's was apparently the only public Veterans Day service in Carson City as other events were being held nearby in Reno and Virginia City. About 30 people attended including a reporter from the *Nevada Appeal*.

Union Dead Among Soldiers to be Reinterred in Arizona on May 16th, 2009

The remains of 70 soldiers buried between 1862 and 1878 were discovered during a construction project in downtown Tucson, Arizona. The 14 Union soldiers were **CALIFORNIA VOLUNTEER INFANTRY** and Cavalry that were part of the famed "California Column" and most are unknown. The bulk of the recovered soldiers were U.S. Regulars serving in Arizona between 1866 and 1878, with most of them identified. The remains will be moved by escorted military convoy from Tucson to the Southern Arizona Veterans' Memorial Cemetery in Sierra Vista on Friday, May 15, 2009. On Saturday, May 16th, the soldiers will be buried in an elaborate ceremony in a special cemetery set-aside exclusively for them.

Veterans, SUVCW members, and Civil War and Indian War re-enactors are encouraged to attend. Event organizers are still accepting volunteers to serve as pallbearers. 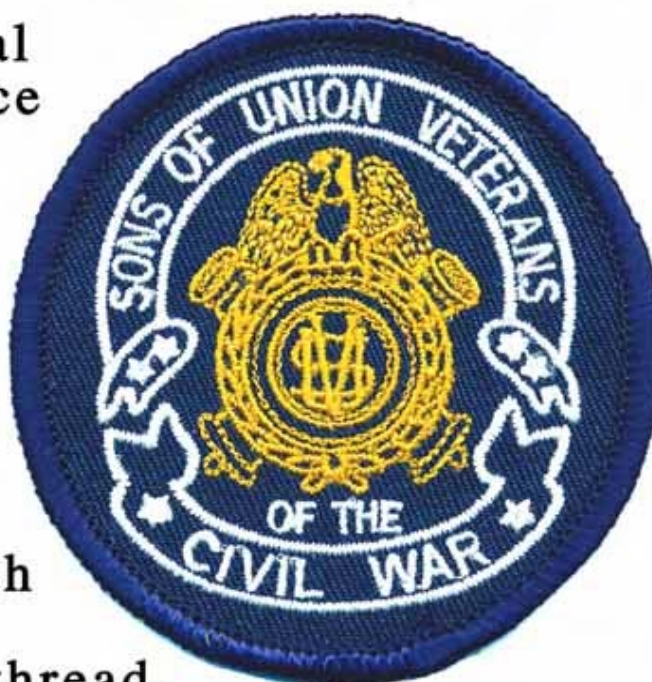
