#### **Notes:**

Described in Civil War Union Monuments (Baruch & Beckman, 1978) as follows: "Lincoln Statue, Lincoln, The Frontiersman, sculptor, Avard Fairbanks, dedicated 1944, located on the grounds of Ewa Elementary School. Mrs. Katherine Burke, a former principal of the school, left money in her will, in 1935, to begin the project. Public subscription added to the fund, and the sculptor, Mr. Fairbanks, who had visited Hawaii, contributed his services."



#### Notes:

Dedicated 26 August 2010. Design includes a map image of the Hawaiian Islands, 50-star flag of the United States, first national flag of the Confederacy, and the state flag of Hawaii. Inscription:

He Ho'omana'o No (In Memory of) Hawai'i Sons of the Civil War

Dedicated to the brave souls from Hawai'i who served in the American Civil War from 1861-1865.

Although the Kingdom of Hawai'i declared itself neutral in the great conflict, some Hawai'i citizens joined the Union and Confederate forces to fight for a cause they supported and to which they were willing to give their last full measure of devotion.

This monument is sponsored by the Hawai'i Sons of the Civil War Memorial Committee, the Hawai'i Civil War Round Table, O'ahu Cemetery and many individuals.



## Type:

Decorative elements in the plot included five cannons (gifts to the GAR by the king), and a pyramidal monument (cenotaph). The cannons were arrayed with one on each corner of the plot and one in the center. The central cannon was a carronade mounted on a naval carriage. Associated with a flag pole which was replaced in the 1950's, and a chain fence supported by pipe stanchions.

#### Notes:

The cannons were a gift to the Grand Army of the Republic by King David Kalakaua in 1884.

The central cannon has been removed from the plot, however, the corner cannons remain, mounted muzzle-up at the corners of the plot. The chain fence and pyramidal monument are also no longer present at the site.

### Type:

Plaque, bronze, depicting bust of Armstrong in bas relief, on display on wall in the hallway of Pauahi Hall. Artist, Alfred Bertram Pegram. Commissioned by The Armstrong Memorial Committee of The Civic Federation of Honolulu, it is a replica of a marble plaque that was presented to the Hampton Institute, VA.

#### Notes:

Dedicated 30 January 1913. Plaque honoring Col. (Bvt-BG) Samuel Chapman Armstrong (1839-1893), 8<sup>th</sup> USCT. Native of Hawaii, and strong supporter of abolition. In later life he was a distinguished educator and founder of Hampton University, VA. Inscription:

1839 – SAMUEL – CHAPMAN – ARMSTRONG – 1893 | Noble Son of Hawaii – Loyal Alumnus of Punahou | Commander of Negro Troops in the Civil War – Founder | of Hampton Institute – Educator and Uplifter of a Race.

# Type:

Statue, white marble, larger than life size (7 feet), weight approximately 2,000 lbs. Metal imitation sword in scabbard attached. Sculpted in China and installed at Saint Francis School prior to 11 November 2013.

#### Notes:

Sculpture depicting Regimental Quartermaster Ira Barnes Dutton (aka, Brother Joseph Dutton) in Civil War dress uniform. Dutton served in the 13th Wisconsin Infantry from 9 Sept. 1861 to 13 Dec. 1865. Converting to Catholicism in 1883, he changed his name to honor St. Joseph. He came to Molokai in 1886 to devote the remainder of his life to service in the leper colony on the island. Dutton died in Kalawao in 1931. The sculpture depicts Dutton wearing the frock coat of a Major-General and shoulder boards of a 4-star general. The kepi appears to display crossed cannons, signifying artillery (Dutton was Infantry).

This is a twin sculpture to one installed at Kamalo, Molokai in August 2013 (HI-Maui-Molokai-Kamalo-Statue-Dutton-2013).
