The Passing of Past Commander-in-Chief Donald W. Shaw

A friend to all, Brother Donald W. Shaw PC-in-C passed away 14 December 2022.

With his membership in the SUVCW, Brother Shaw honored the Civil War service of family member William M. Begole of the 23 Michigan Infantry Regiment and his G-G Grandfather John B. Anderson of the 179th Ohio Volunteer Infantry Regiment.

Brother Shaw was elected to many National level Officer positions and served as Commander-in-Chief from August 2018 through August 2019.

In Honor of Past Commander-in-Chief Brother Donald W. Shaw, National Commander-in-Chief Bruce Frail orders that all Badges, Charters and websites on the Camp, Department and National levels be draped in black for a period of 30 days.

Veterans Day 2022

Camp 18 celebrated Veterans Day last November 11th with a small ceremony at Evergreen Cemetery in Riverside. This was the Camp's first attempt at a Veterans Day Service and it was a success, thanks to Camp Sr. Vice Commander John Morris who wrote the ceremony script and rounded up the volunteer participants.

A week earlier on Saturday, 5 November, SVC Morris, daughter Sarah and Camp 18 Brother Steve Matthews met at the cemetery to place flags on the veteran's graves.

The Service began with floral wreaths placed on stands at the base of the five service flag poles and the POW/MIA flagpole.

Past Camp Commander Brian Stephens greeted the small audience and instructed the Color Guard to advance and present the Colors while the National Anthem played over the P.A. system. Brother Chaplain Bill Daley followed and gave the Invocation.

PCC Stephens began his ceremony remarks referring to the "Star Spangled Banner" and the "Land of the Free" and thanked all Veterans for their service.

A couple of poems followed. Camp Chaplain Daley PCC read "In Flanders Fields" by John McCrae and Camp Brother Steve Mathews read "The Best on Earth" by Joanna Fuchs.

Brother Cameron Quinn presented a wreath to G.A.R. monument and thanked the Union Veterans for their service to the Union.

The Service ended with the playing of TAPS following a 3 round musket volley from the Camp 18 musket team.

Thanks to all who helped make this Veterans Day Service a success, the flags placers, participants and the Camp Color Guard/Musket Team – Brothers Larry Duncan, Matt Crowder, Rudy Velasco and Steve Doyle.

Wreaths Across America

On Saturday, 17 December, Camp 18 participated in a Wreaths Across America Ceremony for the 5th consecutive year at Evergreen Cemetery in Riverside.

The wreaths arrived in a semi-trailer truck on the previous Wednesday. A few cemetery staff, Camp SVC John Morris and Rudy Velasco were on hand to help unload the 104 boxes of wreaths. Past Camp Commander Brian Stephens also showed up to help.

The Wreaths Ceremony began at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday the 17th in front of an audience of about 100.

Other Special guests were members of General Stoneman Camp 18 – Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War.

Special highlights to this year's ceremony were Mr. Tim Apple singing the National Anthem to begin the Service and Kasey Borders playing *TAPS* on her bugle. This year, as the wreaths were being delivered to each of the Military Service Branch flags, Kasey played the corresponding branch anthem – She played the Marine Corps Hymn as the wreath was delivered to the Marine Corps flag and the Caisson song for the U.S. Army flag and so on.....

The Ceremony finished by 9:30 and then the volunteers were organized into groups and each group took a section of the cemetery to place the wreaths on the headstones of our Veterans.

Around the Camp Fire songs of the Union Soldier

Civil War soldiers loved to sing. They sang for the sheer joy of singing as well as to raise spirits, combat homesickness, and relieve boredom. Northern publishers issued thousands of song books with names like "The Camp Fire Songster," "The Flag of Our Union Songster," and "The Yankee Doodle Songster" for Union soldiers.

While the men seemed to prefer patriotic songs, doleful melodies that dwelled on themes of suffering and misery were also very popular. But the soldiers enjoyed as well nonsense songs such as "Pop Goes the Weasel," and they also made up their own songs or provided new lighthearted words to favorite tunes. The songs Northern soldiers created often parodied the trying life they lived, as in the following song, heard in Tennessee in 1863:

Sometimes we have to double quick;
This Dixie mad is mighty sick,
The soldier's fare is very rough,
The bread is hard and the beef is tough,
That's the way they put us through,
I tell you what, it's hard to do.
But we'll obey duty's call,
to conquer Dixie, that is all!

To the religious tune, "The Sweet Bye-and Bye" the men provided the words:

There's a spot that the soldiers all love,
The mess-tent is the place that we mean,
And the dish that we like to see there
Is the old-fashioned, white Army bean.
Chorus: 'Tis the bean that we mean,
And we'll eat as we ne'er ate before
The Army bean, Nice and clean;
We will stick to our beans evermore.

Though "Dixie" was of Northern origin, Union soldiers seldom sang its original words; instead they supplied their own words to the tune:

Away down South in the land of traitors, Rebel hearts and Union haters Look away, look away, look away To the traitor's land.

Fascinating Fact: Words were also provided for different bugle calls that regulated the soldier's lives, such as the following words applied to reveille;

I can't wake 'em up, I can't wake 'em up, I can't wake 'em up in the morning,

I can't wake 'em up, I can't wake 'em up, I can't wake 'em at all!
